



Youth Issues

Pursuing excellence

'Then this Daniel became distinguished above all the other high officials and satraps, because an excellent spirit was in him. And the king planned to set him over the whole kingdom.' Daniel 6:3 (ESV)

What does excellence mean to you? Is it something you strive to attain or something you become? Is it a goal or is it a lifestyle? Maybe you feel it is neither one nor the other but a combination of both.

There are many commentaries about excellence. Here is one I really like:

'If you are going to achieve excellence in big things, you develop the habit in little matters. Excellence is not an exception, it is a prevailing attitude.' Colin Powell.

Excellence, then, is not something that one just arrives at; it comes as a result of daily habits that produce good results.

In our striving for excellence we should never lose sight of the fact that what we do, we should do for the glory of God. Scripture reminds us of this fact. 'And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him.' Colossians 3:17 (KJV).

We all want to be successful, to succeed at our chosen venture or achieve the goals we have dreamed about attaining. God invites us to bring our desires, our dreams and our plans to Him, because He has our interest at heart and knows the best path we should take for a successful outcome. We can believe the promise He has spoken over our life, when He declares in Jeremiah 29:11: ' "For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." '

(NIV.) With this assurance we can be encouraged to press forwards with the confidence that whatever we pursue within the will of God, He will give the empowerment to achieve it and be excellent at it.

Throughout my career and working life I would often repeat Scripture to keep my attitude positive and accept the potential God had given me to excel. In particular Philippians 4:13 was a favourite of mine. It reads (NKJV): 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.'

In my pursuit of excellence, however, there were great motivational and inspirational writers whose expertise in the field of 'success thinking' and achieving life goals has inspired me to reach for the potential



that God has ordained for my life. One of my favourite authors is Brian Tracy, who wrote *The Seven C's of Success*. This was a result of him having studied top achievers and peak performers over the past 25 years. He concluded that these unique men and women have, in most cases, mastered 7 key areas of success. Here's how Brian Tracy categorised the 7 attributes that were common to all of them.

1. Clarity

Eighty percent of success comes from being clear on who you are, what you believe in and what you want.

2. Competence

You can't climb to the next rung on the ladder until you are excellent at what you do now.

3. Constraints

Eighty percent of all obstacles to success come from within. Find out what is constraining in you or your company and deal with it.

4. Concentration

The ability to focus on one thing single-mindedly and see it through until it's done takes more character than anything else.

5. Creativity

Flood your life with ideas from many sources. Creativity needs to be exercised, like a muscle: if you don't use it, you'll lose it.

6. Courage

Most in demand and least in supply, courage is the willingness to do the things you know are right.

7. Continuous learning

Read, at the very least, one book a week on business to keep you miles ahead of the competition. And just as you eat and bathe, organise your time so you spend 30 minutes a day exploring email, sending messages, going through websites – because, like exercise, it's the only way you can keep on top of technology. If you get away from it, you'll lose your edge.

University's first step - Freshers' Fair

One of the first things I experienced in university was the Freshers' Fair. There were many different stalls where I signed up to a variety of societies, from the wonderful to the downright weird. I found myself with free bags, enough pens to last me for the whole of my degree, a various assortment of paperweights and badges, and (when I found the right societies!) cake. I signed up for the Cross Country Society even though I hate the mention of sport, the Malaysian Society just because I liked their food, and the Eurovision Society because I was intrigued as to what on earth they could possibly do, and because, secretly, I quite like a good sing-along.

One of the societies that I would highly recommend to get involved in is the Christian Union. This is a student-led movement that seeks to give each student on campus the opportunity to hear and respond to the Gospel, acting as the evangelistic arm of the local church.

Joining the Christian Union was one of the best things that I ever did. Here's just two reasons why:

1. It's the best way to tell your friends about Jesus.

Before going to university, I would never have dreamt of doing Bible studies with my non-Christian friends, or to tell them unashamedly about my faith. Perhaps I'd be able to have a good conversation here and there, if I was lucky. But evangelistic Bible studies, or mission weeks, they were for the real pros. not for me.

My Christian Union experience helped me to understand that God delights to use me to reach my friends, despite my weaknesses. That He doesn't need evangelism pros, but simply surrendering servants who are willing to be used by Him. The CU challenged me to speak boldly to my friends about Jesus. To ask Tom on my course if he wanted to read the Bible (he said yes!). To study the Gospel of Luke with Ayesha, an international

student who wanted to know more about Christ (one of the most exciting things I have ever done!). To pray for my friends. To have life to the full and to live it with a missional intent

Not only this, but through regular meetings and evangelistic events, the CU provided me with an easy and non-intense way to introduce my friends to Jesus, as well as equipping me with great teaching and resources to help me on the way!

2. Meeting Christians from different denominations provides you with an incredible network of support and encouragement.

Unfortunately, my university didn't have many Adventist students, with about three or four of us overall. However, by joining the Christian Union I met many sincere. Christcentred Christians in other denominations who were seeking to do exactly the same as I was; to follow Jesus in a secular environment and to reach friends with the Good

News of the Cross. We prayed, studied and fellowshipped together. I was encouraged. I was challenged. I was equipped. We had our

> differences in doctrine, but these did not diminish our friendships and our common goal (In fact many discussions led to their investigation of biblical teachings on subjects such as the Sabbath or Hell!).

My experience at university was greatly defined by what the Christian Union taught me: confidence in the Gospel, boldness in speech, a desire for others to know Christ, and joy in the Cross. I saw friends come to Christ, and have been equipped and encouraged to live for Jesus in all circumstances, whether in halls with people I've only just met, a lecture when everyone laughs at the Christian worldview, or now, the scary world of post-uni life. So when you're wandering around the Freshers' Fair,

take the free pen (and hopefully the free cake), and sign up for the CU! Or, alternatively, start up your own Adventist Student Society! The time that you spend at university is defining – and there is no better time to know Christ and to make Him known

Aberdaron 2014

Aberdaron, Wales, home to the Advent Youth Campsite in Glan Yr Afon, each summer hosts three camps put on by the NEC Youth Department. From 10 to 17 August it was Earliteen Camp for those aged 13-16. Almost 50 teens came from all over the country for a fun-filled week that included rock climbing/abseiling, coasteering, canoeing, football, camp ball (those that have been know what it is), go karting, beach games, hiking and much more. Some came for the first time but for many they were returning on what is a regular part of their summer schedule. Throughout the week the outdoor activities were conducted by fully qualified instructors and they aimed to challenge the campers with activities that are not a part of our normal everyday lives. Building determination and overcoming one's fears is something that teaches valuable lessons to the campers and can be used in everyday life. Throughout the week we were blessed by the thought-provoking worships from Pastor Isaac Liburd as we looked into creation versus evolution, how to believe when there is little proof and the three angels' messages. The worships

were engaging and involved the campers acting out key points or Bible verses and explaining certain passages from the Bible. The camp was led out by Derek Simon, who recently graduated from Newbold, and Pastor Bran, along with staff from all over the NEC who served as counsellors, kitchen staff, activities leaders and

This year there was a week's gap between Earliteen Camp and Youth Camp for the 17+ age category. Youth Camp was a small camp with 13 campers but that did not take away from the fun, fellowship and good times that were had by all who were there. While the weather was not the greatest it did not detract from getting out in the beautiful countryside to rock climb, canoe and go coasteering. Abseiling tested their fear of heights, canoeing tested their teamwork skills, while coasteering tested their ability to follow instructions and follow the leader – all while enjoying the great outdoors. For many it was their first time doing such activities and, despite their age and size, the same fears had to be overcome. In the words of one of the instructors for the week, 'The outdoors are just one big massive playground and cannot compare with sitting at home watching the telly.' We were well fed by the catering team, led by Cheryl Banton, with some campers even commenting that they had eaten too much that week! The timing of Youth Camp meant that it coincided with the Ice Bucket Challenge surge that was sweeping through the country at the time and no fewer than 12 people took up the challenge throughout the week. Some were aided by the big barrels at Aberdaron and a few even took advantage of the dumper to get a really good soaking. We were again blessed throughout the week with some excellent devotions by Pastor Jonathan Holder, who opened up the book of Proverbs, showing how 'God is concerned with the ordinary parts of our lives'.

Aberdaron provides a great retreat for the youth in our church to connect with each other, to connect with God, to try challenging new activities, to learn new skills and to make friends with other youth from around the country, and if you have never been then plan to come next year! Aberdaron 50th Anniversary

From 16 to 18 May more than 100 people gathered at the Aberdaron Advent Campsite in North Wales for the 50th Anniversary celebrations. The campsite was purchased 50 years ago by Pastor Ron Surridge, who was serving as the Youth Director of the NEC at the time. Pastor Surridge believes that the Lord led him to this site, which was able to be acquired for a very reasonable sum of money for the purpose of youth ministry. The first camp was held in much more primitive conditions, with outdoor cooking, a limited water supply and tents, instead of the chalets, camping pods or slick modern tents that we enjoy today. Notwithstanding this, those who came had a great summer and the foundations were laid for many years to come. In the early

years the hall and kitchen as we know it now was built, largely by volunteers from church who dedicated time, money and holidays to make what many have since enjoyed. Throughout the weekend we heard stories from campers from every decade since – the '70s, '80s, '90s, '00s – many of whom now send their children or grandchildren to Aberdaron; they were all able to reminisce about the 'good old days'.

For many people 'Aberdaron', as the site is known by those who come, has become an annual fixture in the annual calendar. It is a place to retreat from work life, normal church life and city life, and in the peace and quiet connect with God and fellowship

with other like-minded friends. There were several couples at the anniversary weekend who have been to Aberdaron every year since the site opened, taking the meaning of being a 'regular' to a whole new level!

Present at this anniversary weekend were several of the previous NEC Youth Directors, Pastor Ron Surridge, Pastor Bob Rodd (who entertained us with an old-fashioned slide show, complete with running commentary), Pastor Steve Palmer and Pastor Alan Hush, along with former NEC Family Life Director, Pastor Paul Clee. Many of the present NEC administration and departmental directors were also there, providing a link between the past, present and future. The site, named locally as Glan Yr Afon, was named by the church as the Advent Youth campsite, as it was originally run and operated by the Youth Department, but it has grown in both size and infrastructure since it was bought 50 years ago. Originally it was just the lower field, but soon this was expanded to include what is known to regulars as the 'top field', and around the year 2000 the old caravans were replaced by the

modern Scandinavian-style chalets that we have today. There are plans to develop the site even further to increase the capacity and provide year-round accommodation and activities. The site is now no longer run by the Youth Department, but by a dedicated camp site manager, who keeps the place running smoothly as it is used on a weekly basis by churches and other groups. The summer camps, including Special Needs, Family, Junior, Earliteen, Youth and Midlands, run each year and provide a service to the members of the church.

Science and Faith

Evolution and creation

As a university student I faced a struggle to find a balance between the evolutionary teachings of science and the Word of God. Today, youth face a more intense struggle because evolutionary ideas are much more widely accepted than 55 years ago.

Scientists observe nature and try to find out how nature came to be as it is today, how it works, and what we can deduce about the future. Interpreting what we observe around us requires a worldview, a set of answers to basic questions that define who we are. This is very important: a faulty worldview will lead to faulty conclusions about the world and life.

A Christian worldview would likely contain such notions as 'God exists and is the Creator of all there is', 'God loves His creation and creatures', 'sin has separated us from God', and 'God has a plan to bring us back to Himself through Jesus Christ'.

The common worldview of materialistic natural science says that 'all the universe is made of are things like mass, time, energy, and motion', and 'there is no influence from outside the universe in what

happens under the sun' This worldview excludes all action by God – if He happens to exist at all. But, surely, our God does interfere with His creation, even for our good Sure, science has shown us many interesting facts about the composition of matter and about the universe. Everything

that exists is made up out of a collection of just thirty fundamental particles such as electrons, quarks, neutrinos, and others. However, on the basis of its worldview, science has come to the conclusion that the origin of life is not well understood; life is short, and the future unattractive.

Fortunately, there is more to the universe than science claims. Astronomy teaches us that the conditions on planet Earth are not only such that human life can thrive here (of course, if this were not so I would not be here to write about it), but they are also unique. Life is a finely-balanced commodity that requires about one hundred conditions to be guite precisely fulfilled within very narrow limits. We call this fine-tuning. Go beyond those limits and life cannot exist.

The conditions for the production of life involve, among others, the values of physical quantities like the gravitational constant and the charge of the electron, and the strength of most physical forces such as the strong and weak nuclear forces, and the electromagnetic force. And, since most physical and biochemical processes require energy, a good constant source of energy is crucial.

is certainly not obvious, but the rate of expansion of the universe is a very important quantity that requires fine-tuning with a precision of 1 in 1060 (that is a 1 followed by 60 zeros – long odds, for sure!). If the universe expands too rapidly, it becomes impossible to form stars. If it expands too slowly, the universe would have collapsed on itself a long time

sun and, thus, no energy to support life. Since more than half of our body is water, the presence of water in all its phases is essential for life. Therefore, Earth's distance from the sun – our energy source – must be just right: too close and too much water turns into vapour, too far away and too much water turns into ice.

Here is one more example: the atoms in a molecule are held together by the electromagnetic force and bond with other atoms through the exchange of electrons. If the electromagnetic force is too strong, the atoms hold on to their electrons and no bonds are made. If this force is too weak, the electrons are not bound to any atom and complex molecules like DNA will not be possible. No DNA, no life.

How can a mechanical universe governed only by natural law have the foresight to produce a planet like Earth where these delicate

requirements for life are fulfilled? Can we ascribe to the fundamental particles that constitute the universe the intelligence that foresight requires? This argument and all the fine-tunings are strong arguments for the existence of an intelligent Being, God.

Another result from the study of astronomy is that Earth's location in the universe is just about the very best for exploring what the universe is like. Earth's location in the Milky Way, far from its centre and just on the inside of a spiral arm, allows us the best possible view of the rest of the universe with its many galaxies and other interesting objects that give us some idea of the greatness and omnipotence of God. The care wherewith Earth and life are protected declare God's love.

It looks as if the Creator invites us to study His handiwork so that we may know Him better. The heavens declare the glory of a loving God who has promised that this sin-affected universe will one day soon be replaced by new heavens and a new earth where love, joy, and peace will last forever!




